All of us perceive differently. Some are born blind, and have never seen. To them, their entire worldview and experience of life is based off of their hearing and remaining senses. Imagine not having seen your entire life. Would it feel normal?

This has been a theme in my life, and I wish to share my story, as we can use it for building our foundation.


I was born in 1967, entirely blind. My parents were told by the hospital staff, that I was biologically blind because of a respiration fault during my birth. I would never gain the ability to see. This was to believe, since I apparently did not react in any way to visual input. As I grew up, I had to rely on my other senses, while I knew others had something else. I was always curious about this, and wondered what it might be to see. For those who are able to see, I feel as though it can be related what it would be like to see a new color – or even be able to see infrared light, as we know some some snakes, fishes and frogs can.

We can all keep trying to imagine what it would be like to experience another sense, something we would never otherwise have thought or seen of, that out of a sudden pops into our lives. Our memories and thoughts, are based on stimuli from our senses. Therefore I can't imagine visual pictures, or think in images, as a person with vision would be able to. That is, unless we discover a way to experience senses we have always had but had been undiscovered our entire life.

Recently I had such an experience, when I this year (2021) was reading a blog post on vision recovery online. Researchers from UCLA and Baylor had found a way to draw shapes directly on the part of the human brain, that is supposed to handle visual stimuli and interpret it. Maybe one day, I will have the opportunity to experience a sense, I never otherwise would.

Our lack of senses remains an actual unknown, and that is our philosophical foundation. Senses and experiences outside of our worldview exist, perhaps we can not directly experience them.

Plato, an ancient Greek philosopher, talks about this in the Allergory of the Cave. Even though Plato is a bit of a generalist, I still think this is worth mentioning.



In the Allergory of the Cave, Plato describes people locked from birth, living in a cave, only seeing shadows on the wall as a result of shapes being held in front of the light of a fireplace. This is the reality of these people, and this is their entire worldview. They never saw or did anything other than seeing these shadows in the Cave. Plato, being an optimist, writes that it might be possible to get out of the cave for these people. But if one does get out of the cave and discovers heaven, grass, earth, trees, and comes back, the others would have a hard time comprehending the experience.

This is slightly different than how our senses work. Plato claims, that an area can be reached where our senses might discover something completely new from their current point of view.

What is beyond our senses is to me unimaginable. There are people who claim to experience unique senses, see certain new patterns or colors. I do believe in rare occurrences, and as corrupt as it sounds I myself have encountered mysteries in my life.

The mystery of birth, earth, love – but no sensations beyond what "I" am capable of.

Having a respiration fault during birth, I have realized throughout my life, that I am a living proof for senses to exist out of my existence, that are to be experienced by others excluded myself.

This is something truly special. We identify with our stimuli and surroundings, but things exist that we might or might not experience due to our somehow set limitations.

Somehow, everything comes from something.
